The Readings

The First Reading: Acts 10:34-43

Then Peter began to speak to them: 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but

God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

The Gospel Reading: John 20:1-18

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.' Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went towards the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' When she had said this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and

your God."' Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

Reflection with Richard

Alleluia! Christ is Risen!

He is Risen indeed! Alleluia!

These are the traditional words with which Christians greet each other in Eastertide. It is a simple statement of truth, fact, faith and belief. It is an encouragement to one another and a sign of recognition.

The exchange is not even ten words long, yet it states the most glorious understanding that Jesus, who was dead, is now alive.

When he was teaching the disciples he had spoken of his death several times and had even explained to them that he would rise again. But it must have been impossible or them to really take in the truth of it until it had happened.

But when it did happen. They began to live a new adventure: A life where death is not the end; a life where God is always with us, around us, within us, beside us. And they recognised God in a new way too.

Until this day they had believed that God was powerful, that God was real and a living God. They had heard the stories of God parting the Red Sea and freeing the people from slavery in Egypt. But they were stories of long ago.

Now, before their very eyes Jesus had parted the water of death and walked straight through. God had broken the slavery of sin and the prison of death. Everything had changed.

And all this is celebrated in these nine words: Alleluia! Christ is Risen!

He is Risen indeed! Alleluia!

I remember that on the Easter morning when I was working in France, I came in to work in the morning and was met by the local French Catholic Priest. He shook me by the hand and with a great smile said in French:

"Le Christ est réssuscité!"

I never did become particularly fluent in French and the priest's expectant look didn't help my brain as it tried to work out what he had said to me.

And then it struck me, that he had spoken the great Eastertide greeting: "Christ is Risen."

But understanding it was only half my problem. Even though I had worked out what he had said, I had no idea what the response to it was in French.

He held his expectant gaze and I found some words:

"Oui! C'est vrai!" I said. "Yes! It's true!"

The priest through back his head in joyful laughter at my unorthodox response and my continuing difficulty with the language. "That is not what I expected," he said in English, "but you have the meaning!"

And isn't that the great wonder of this day. How spectacular it is that God should come to be with us and die before our eyes, and then come back to life. It is unexpected, and yet it's meaning is to show us how much impact God has upon our lives.

God is always with us, a God, stronger than death calls us to live in his presence each and every day. Whatever we face, we meet it in the presence of a living God who has overcome even death.

And so for the next 50 days when we meet, we share the wonder of the Easter greeting:

Alleluia! Christ is Risen!

He is Risen indeed! Alleluia!

We believe in God the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named.

We believe in God the Son, who lives in our hearts through faith, and fills us with his love.

We believe in God the Holy Spirit,

who strengthens us
with power from on high.
We believe in one God;
Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

Lord Jesus, as the women came to the tomb in sorrow, their eyes full of tears, we are aware of so much sorrow still in our world. We lift to you now all the places where conflict exists – between nations, between factions, between families, between partners.

We bring to you our suffering planet: where the beauty you have created is being squeezed by humanity's selfishness and greed.

We bring to you all those who are in pain: those we know and love who are sick, full of sorrow, loneliness or despair.

Lord, we deeply desire that your resurrected presence will fill those people and places of pain and redeem them, bringing the new life that is so dearly needed. Touch every heart with your eternal love, filling each seemingly hopeless situation with the promise of resurrected, everlasting hope.

Lord, the news of your rising was so amazing that even your closest friends struggled to believe it at first. We pray for all those we know who struggle to believe and trust in you.
