

The Readings

First reading: Philippians 4: 4-9

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you.

Second reading: John 6: 25-35

When they found him on the other side of the lake, they said to him, 'Rabbi, when did you come here?' Jesus answered them, 'Very truly, I tell you, you are looking for me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves. Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For it is on him that God the Father has set his seal.' Then they said to him, 'What must we do to perform the works of God?' Jesus answered them, 'This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent.' So they said to him, 'What sign are you going to give us then, so that we may see it and believe you? What work are you performing? Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written, "He gave them bread from heaven to eat."' Then Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, it was not Moses who gave you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world.' They said to him, 'Sir, give us this bread always.'

Jesus said to them, 'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.

Reflection with Alison

"The Bread That Lasts"

Philippians 4:4–9 reminds us to "Rejoice in the Lord always." It's a call to gratitude ,not just when life is easy, but in every season. Paul writes these words from prison, yet his heart is full of peace. Why? Because his focus is on God's goodness, not on his circumstances. He says, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God."

Harvest is our yearly reminder to do exactly that , to pause, to notice, and to give thanks.

The fields may not look the same as they did in Paul's day, but we still rely on God's provision: for rain, for sunshine, for people who grow, harvest, transport, and prepare our food. Behind every loaf of bread and tin of soup is the steady faithfulness of God at work through human hands.

In John 6:25–35, Jesus says, "I am the Bread of Life." The crowds were looking for more of the bread He had miraculously provided, but Jesus gently redirected them. He reminded them that while ordinary bread fills us for a day, the true nourishment of our souls comes from Him. The "bread that lasts" isn't baked in an oven, it's born in a heart that trusts and follows Christ.

At harvest, we give thanks for both kinds of bread:

- the food that sustains our bodies,
- and the spiritual food that sustains our spirits.

And we remember that God's provision isn't meant to stop with us. Gratitude always leads to generosity.

That's why it's so moving to see how many people continue to give to local food banks, especially in hard times. When you place a tin of beans, a bag of pasta, or a box of cereal in a collection basket, you are sharing the love of Christ in a very real and practical way. You are helping to feed the hungry ,not just with food, but with hope.

So today, as we celebrate harvest:

- Let us give thanks for the abundance we enjoy.
- Let us pray for those who struggle to afford even daily bread.
- And let us recommit ourselves to being people of kindness, peace, and generosity, shining the light of Christ wherever there is need.

May we rejoice in the Lord always.

May the peace of God guard our hearts and minds.

And may we daily receive and share the Bread of Life.

Let us declare our faith in God.

We believe in God the Father,
from whom every family
in heaven and earth is named.

We believe in God the Son,
who lives in our hearts through faith,
and fills us with his love.

We believe in God the Holy Spirit,
who strengthens us
with power from on high.

We believe in one God;
Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Prayers of Intercessions with Astrid

St Paul's words remind us that the Lord is near, that we should not be anxious, but make our requests known to God in prayer and petition, with thanksgiving. So we come Lord, thankful for the gifts and freedoms we enjoy, remembering we come to you at a time when the lives of people in so many places are painful and uncertain, where loss and sorrow are never far away.

Lord we pray for the people of Israel, for families of hostages, for Palestinians in Gaza, hungry, frightened, sick or injured, and we pray for aid workers willingly staying in the most dangerous situations to do what they can to help. Lord guide those who have it in their power to bring a humane and lasting settlement to this whole unhappy region, and Lord we pray for an end to war and violence in Ukraine, in Sudan and those other areas of conflict and unrest that we hear little about.

Lord we pray for people suffering from the devastation of floods, gales, landslips, earthquakes. We are reminded of the risk to our lovely world, not only from the destructive force of war, but from what we label 'natural disasters', made more likely by our greed and thoughtlessness in our treatment of the environment. Make us wise and faithful stewards of your creation, living lightly on the Earth so that it may blossom and flourish now and in future.

Lord in your mercy hear our prayer

Lord we pray for our own country where we have so many blessings but still so many problems, where people struggle with rising costs and inequalities. We pray for families in unsatisfactory housing, for those with nowhere to call home, and for the agencies, charities and volunteers trying so hard to help. We pray for our own communities, our villages, our friends and neighbours, those with their own anxieties about their future, their health, their families. We pray for the lonely, those who have lost someone dear, the people whose needs we know and those we may not know. We pray for the clergy and lay people who provide leadership for our parishes and our worship, and we pray for the person you will call to serve as team rector for the parishes of Harden, Wilsden, Cullingworth and Denholme.

As members of a wider worshipping family than our own small part, we pray for Sarah Mullally, called to be Archbishop of Canterbury. Lord, pour upon her the strength, wisdom and vision that she needs as she leads and serves us.

Merciful Father accept these prayers for the sake of your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ.
